

Community-Engaged Research



- Partnerships of community members, researchers, agency representatives and academics or institutional representatives
- Shared research goals
- Respect, collaboration, equity and fairness.

How is Community-Engaged Research Different?

From:

Researchers acting upon a community, such as a clinical trial at a community health center

To:

Researchers, community agencies, and community members working side by side



Why Community-Engaged Research?

- Health problems exist within context of people's lives;
- Explanations found in messy complexity of real life; and,
- Community-engaged research can produce results directly translatable to human health.





What Does it Mean to Conduct Research that is Community-Engaged?

- Develop research questions concerning health issues of concern to the community;
- People are more likely to support the research when they understand the purpose;
- Design produces user-friendly, culturally sensitive, accurate and valid practices and measures;
- Involvement in analysis and interpretation can provide important **explanations** of results;
- Opportunity to build greater **trust and respect** between academic researchers and communities; and,
- Research may be more likely to lead to improvements in community health.





We facilitate community-engaged research by:

- Partnering with communities to enhance mutual understanding and build the capacity to enable community-based participatory research;
- Implementing a program for **pilot grants** that facilitates community-academic research collaboration;
- Creating educational programs for both academia and community; and,
- Developing research dissemination models and using information technology.
